The Wheatbelt Integrity Group held their annual Soil Restoration Field Day at the Newdegate Bowling Club on Wednesday, 17th Oct., 2018. The event was well supported with 40 people in attendance. This years speaker was farmer Colin Seis from Gulgong, NSW.

The topics discussed included perennial pasture cropping,mixed species cover crops, the importance of stock in agriculture and the extensive research that has been conducted on 'Winona' (the Seis farm).
